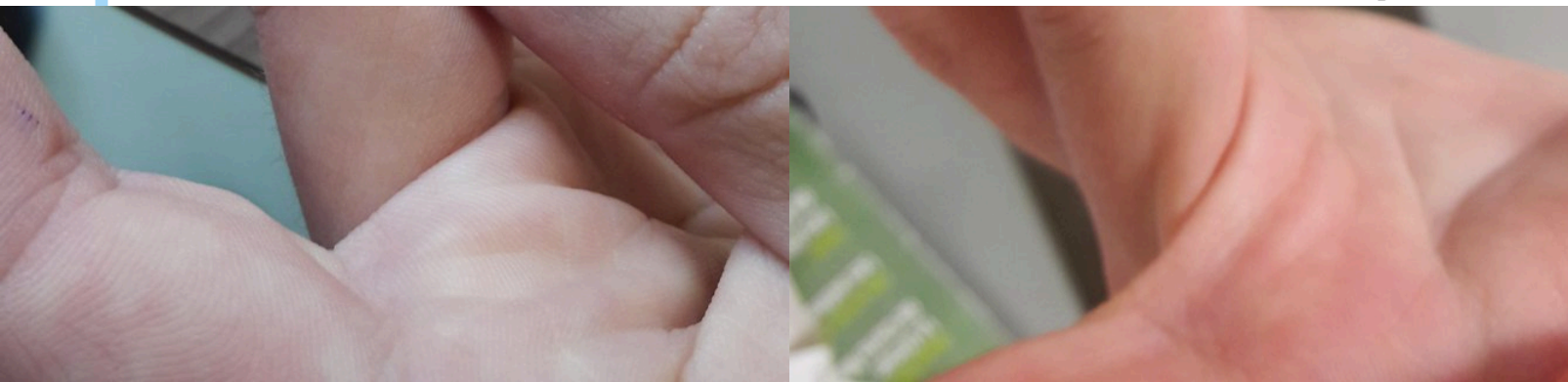
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Safety first !!!

So here is a simple question tweeps. Which solvent could have caused such injury after poking one's finger with a syringe and injecting 1-2 drops of solvent. 15 minutes and 2 hrs pictures





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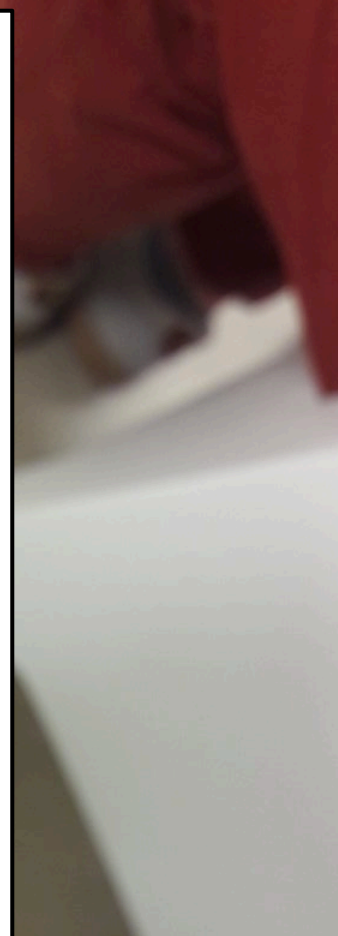
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This was a drop of dichloromethane in a needle. It required serious surgery and healed only after 8 months.

This injury is not specific to DCM – any organic solvent may cause fast necrosis. Even water, if injected, will cause cell disruption through osmotic shock

MSDS most often contains information about inhalation, ingestion, skin or eye contact, but NO injection



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
